DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Brian Granger, Stage Director

Laramie, Wyoming—the place where tonight's drama unfolds—sits on a latitude line only slightly north of Columbus, with Toledo being our closest match to that city. Yet Laramie is over 6,000 feet higher than we are here in terms of elevation above sea level. In other words, it's a colder place than Columbus, typically a full ten degrees or more colder there for its highest and lowest temperatures in October than it is here. In my mind, I associate any place colder than Columbus with winter clothing and the kind of year-round gear that people in cold climates seem to love: flannels, parka vests, boots and scarves.

Clothing is an aspect of the Shepard case that has always lingered in my mind. When his killers left Shepard for dead, they took his wallet and his shoes with them, thinking the shoes might be worth something. The removal of his belongings always seemed particularly gross to me, for it reminds me of the way the Christian Bible describes how Jesus Christ's clothes were stripped from him and divided up (John 19:24). This abuse of a body not only violates nearly every ancient culture's laws against the treatment of a dead body (including that of criminals) but seems so unnecessarily mean to the people that person has left behind, as if to say the value of the deceased was summarized in these objects that the deceased's love ones did not even have the right to claim. So from the beginning, I knew that winter clothes needed to be part of my artistic statement about this piece—a kind of first and last statement, on comfort and protection, on the forms of physical and moral coldness that we encounter in life.

I've mentioned the Bible (I feel I must, as a P.K.—"preacher's kid"), but something I was also drawn to in this piece is its non-preachy quality. Yes, if you are a person who ascribes to a faith you will be able to hear the piece speaking to you. And also, yes, if you are not a person of faith—if you draw more inspiration from science, or from a personal sense of the great and beautiful, unfolding mystery of the universe—you will still hear the piece speaking in a language that says "I see you" and is for you. Because you are alive. You are here. You are meant to consider this story with us.

Craig Hella Johnson, Johnson's fabulous writer-collaborators Michael Dennis Brown and Lesléa Newman, along with their Conspirare artists, asked the world in 2016 to consider what an imaginative witnessing of Shepard's story means. I believe that Theatre is a community conversation, and so as we come in from the cold tonight to engage with a story that is nearly two decades past, we ask our fellow community members for this same moment of shared consideration. I'm so thankful to have been able to take part in this gathering, and to hear in our rehearsals the passion and beauty of these voices. As you will see, they do great justice to this already powerful work. I simply hope that, long after our evening of community consideration ends, that

these words and melodies, and whatever stirrings of peace and hope they raise in you, stays with you. Tuck yourself in them as protection in these cold times, and carry them with you on your journey.

Considering Matthew Shepard references **murder & assault**. While there are no graphic portrayals of these acts in our staging, we feel it is important to remind the audience of this sensitive content.


Please be aware that the F-word slur is briefly sung in "A Protestor."






CREATIVE TEAM

Brian Granger (Stage Director) is an LGBTQ and BIPOC preacher's kid (PK); an actor/director/singer; playwright/screenwriter and musical theatre maker; performance/theatre and film scholar; lover of pizza, puppets, and interior design; a social justice/environmental/animal advocate; and a lifelong consumer/nerd of comic books, science fiction, fantasy, and horror fiction. Granger is currently teaching at Ohio Wesleyan University. They hold degrees from Kenyon College (B.A.), The Ohio State University (M.F.A.), NYU/Tisch School of the Arts (M.F.A.), and the University of California, Santa Barbara (PhD).







Lauren Spavelko (Stage Manager) is a composer & educator. She composes to inspire deeper connections with one another and ourselves—listeners find play, healing, joy, and catharsis. Her works have been performed across the United States, as well as in Italy, Singapore, Vietnam, and Canada. Her work has been awarded multiple prizes including the Spoleto Festival's Young Composers Prize (Italy, *Baby Book*), the American Prize in Vocal Chamber Music: Charles Ives Award (*From Edna, with Love*), and the Ruth Anderson Commission Prize (IAWM, *Black Box 2.0*). Mrs. Byrne works as a soloist for a variety of liturgical services and is a singer with the professional chamber ensemble ProArteOHIO. She has also sung with the schola at St Joseph Cathedral, Ensemble Una Voce and Capital University's Choral Union.



Coshel Caudill is a senior at The Ohio State University, pursuing a Bachelor's in Vocal Music Education. During his time at Ohio State, Mr. Caudill has received numerous accolades and awards for academic and choral excellence. At Ohio state, he served as section leader of the Ohio State University Men's Glee Club, as well as a rehearsal assistant in Chorale. He has studied with Dr. Robert Ward, Dr. Colin Knoth, and Jordan Saul. Mr. Caudill currently student teaches at Hilliard Darby, where he assists with day-to-day logistics and classes. He currently serves as Choir Director at Hilliard United Methodist Church. In addition, he is a Section Leader and regular soloist with the New Albany Symphony Chorus. He has toured domestically and internationally as a chorister and as a soloist, most recently at Lincoln Center in New York City, Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic.



Heather Chute (alto) is a graduate of Capital University where she received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in vocal music education. She has taught her entire career with Hamilton Local Schools, leading the choirs in grades 7-12. She is celebrating her 25th year as the alto section leader at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Her other performance endeavors include ProArte Ohio, The Columbus Choral Artists and Fior Angelico. Heather was also a 2023 recipient of the Manilow Music Project Award.

Billy Edwards (bass) is excited to return to the stage with Converging Arts Columbus having previously appeared in Astronomer Dreaming. A native of Newark, OH, he studied music at Alderson-Broaddus College in West Virginia before moving back to the area. Over the past several years, Billy has served as Director for Newark's Land of Legend Barbershop Chorus, and has been involved with music leadership at several churches including Bremen United Methodist Church, Maple Street United Methodist in Lancaster, and currently at Holy Trinity Lutheran in Upper Arlington. He has also been in productions at Opera Columbus, Weathervane Playhouse in Newark and performs with Fior Angelico, and Lancaster Chorale. Billy is looking forward to telling this powerful and important story of Matthew Shepherd.

Liz Files (soprano) is a middle school Intervention Specialist who works with a variety of diverse learners. Outside of the school day, she teaches voice, piano, and violin lessons, she helps lead her school's Drama Club, and she is a section leader and choral librarian at Trinity United Methodist Church. Liz has experience singing in a variety of ensembles including multiple chamber groups, women's choirs, musical theater groups, show choir, and a quartet. She has also performed with the Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra as a violinist. She holds two undergraduate degrees in education from Muskingum University, one in Music Education and one in Special

Education, where she also completed research exploring the effects of music and music therapy on individuals with disabilities.








Ryan Jenkins (tenor) is a high school choral director, an active choral conductor, and vocalist from Columbus, Ohio. He has been teaching choral music since 2017 and is currently the Choral Director at Columbus Academy where he teaches middle school and high school choir. Along with his teaching, Ryan is the Director of Traditional Music at Trinity United Methodist Church. As a vocalist, Ryan has sung with Opera Columbus, ProArteOHIO (formerly Lancaster Chorale), the Sacred Music Institute of America, Trinity Lutheran Seminary, and the National Anthem for the Columbus Crew. Prior to his current appointments, Ryan has experience working with a wide variety of groups including chamber ensemble, children's choir, competitive a cappella and show choir, community choir, sacred music, and high school/collegiate groups. Ryan holds degrees from The Ohio State University (B.M. in Vocal Performance) and University of Toronto (M.M. in choral conducting) where he studied with Dr. Hilary Apfelstadt.

Andrew LeVan (tenor) is from Dublin, Ohio. He attended The College of Wooster and received his Master's Degree in vocal performance from Indiana University where he studied with Dr. Brian Horne. Andrew premiered the role of Nô in P. Q. Phan's opera The Tale of Lady Thi Kính and has performed as Mayor Upfold (Albert Herring), a Priest in Philip Glass' Akhnaten and others in performances with the Indiana University Opera Theater, The Indiana Festival Theater and the Ohio Light Opera. He was most recently seen as Henry Ford in CCT's production of Ragtime, and as a soloist in Gallery Player's production of Sondheim on Sondheim. He currently studies with Dr. Daniel St, Professor of Music at Ohio University.









Matthew Mac Manus (tenor) most recently appeared as Crook Finger Jack in The Threepenny Opera and will portray Don Basilio and Don Curzio in Le Nozze di Figaro with Opera Columbus this spring. Last winter, he was the tenor soloist for Opera Columbus' Messiah Sing-Along tour and portrayed Le Remendado in Carmen to open Opera Columbus' 2023-24 season. In summer 2022, Mr. Mac Manus made his international debut as Rinuccio (Gianni Schicchi), Bardolfo (Falstaff), and Don Curzio (Le Nozze di Figaro) at the Festival of International Opera Italia. Other engagements include singing in Opera Project Columbus' Un ballo in maschera chorus and numerous scenes performances: Gabriel von Eisenstein (Die Fledermaus), Nemorino (L'elisir d'amore), Ferrando (Così fan tutte),



Jaquino (Fidelio), and Banquo (MacBeth). In spring 2022, he portrayed the Tenor in the world premiere of Arseny Gusev's The Blind. Mr. Mac Manus earned his Bachelor's from Miami University (studying with Dr. Alison Acord and Dr. Christina Haan) and a Master of Music in Vocal Performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music, studying with American baritone Jesse Blumberg.

Carolyn Redman, mezzo-soprano (alto) is originally from Bellevue, Ohio and received a MM and DMA in vocal performance from the Ohio State University. She has performed operatic roles as well as musical theater roles with various professional companies including Des Moines Metro Opera, Opera/Columbus, Opera Project Columbus, Columbus Light Opera, Cincinnati Opera, Weathervane Playhouse, and Lyric Opera Cleveland. She was selected as an apprentice artist with both Des Moines Metro Opera and Cincinnati Opera Young Artists programs and was also chosen to perform in masterclasses and performances at the Instituto Superior de Arte of the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires, Argentina. She has been a winner



or finalist in four competitions, including a first place finish in the Opera/Columbus vocal competition. Recent roles include Ruth in The Pirates of Penzance, La Badessa in Suor Angelica, Berta in II Barbiere di Siviglia, Miss Todd in The Old Maid and the Thief, Zita in Gianni Schicchi, Gertrude in Roméo et Juliette, Martha/Ayah in The Secret Garden, Golde in Fiddler on the Roof, Jo in Mark Adamo's Little Women, Second Lady in The Magic Flute, and Countess Charlotte Malcolm in A Little Night Music. She has also been a featured soloist in oratorios and other concert works with groups such as Cantari Singers, Denison University, Columbus Bach Ensemble, Marion Civic Chorus, Master Singers, Inc. Chorale, New Albany Symphony, Saint Joseph Cathedral, Westerville Symphony, and the American Institute of Musical Studies in Graz, Austria. In addition to performing, she serves on the voice faculty of Denison University.

Rhonda K. Rom (soprano) holds a Master of Music degree in vocal performance from the University of Denver's Lamont School of Music and a Bachelor of Music in vocal performance from Arizona State University. Ms. Rom serves as the Worship Director at Peace United Methodist Church in Pickerington, OH where she leads traditional and modern worship. She enjoys teaching private voice in her home studio and has served on faculty at Kenyon College, Mount Vernon Nazarene University, Dallas Baptist University, and Texas Woman's University. As a soloist, Ms. Rom has performed major works such as Messiah, Magnificat, The Creation, and Faure's Requiem. She has special interest as a recitalist focusing on a wide variety of genres including art song, musical theater, and contemporary styles. Ms. Rom has also sung and recorded with renowned choral ensembles including The Santa Fe Desert Chorale, Orpheus Chamber Singers and central Ohio's premier choral ensemble ProArteOHIO.

Gretchen Rutz Leist (alto) is a distinguished professional based in Columbus, Ohio, with a diverse background in both music and law.
